This Statistical Brief presents data from the Household Component of the Medical Expenditure Panel Survey (MEPS-HC) regarding direct payment (e.g., private, out-of-pocket, Medicaid, etc.) for the medical treatment of children ages 0 - 17 in 2006. The top five most costly conditions were: mental disorders, asthma, trauma-related disorders, acute bronchitis, and infectious diseases. Data do not include over-the-counter medications or ambulance services.

- Although the highest yearly expenditures were for the treatment of mental health disorders (\$8.9 billion), comparatively few children received these services; the average yearly expenditure for treatment was \$1,931 per child.
- \$6.1 billion went toward the treatment of trauma-related disorders (physical injuries from accidents or violence), averaging \$910 per child.
- Medicaid paid for 35.2% of the expenditures for the treatment of mental health disorders and 11.5% for trauma-related disorders.
- Out-of-pocket expenditures were highest for the treatment of mental health disorders.

The MEPS-HC is a nationally representative longitudinal study of health care utilization, expenditures, insurance, health status, access to care and satisfaction with care and other characteristics among the U.S. non-institutionalized population. The Household Component of the MEPS was designed in 1996; it "introduces a new panel or sample of households into the survey every year and is conducted continually rather than once every 10 years."
